Activities Report 2006-2007

Two new professors, Margaret Tudeau-Clayton and Andrew McIntyre, joined our staff this year, helping to consolidate our Bachelor program and enabling the institute to contribute significantly to innovative faculty-wide Master programs in literature and in linguistics. Other changes include faculty advising for all incoming BA students, an exchange agreement with the University of Newcastle, Australia, and institute tea parties that were very well attended.

Staff

Margaret Tudeau-Clayton, our new Professor of English Literature, is primarily specialized in Early Modern Literature. She joined the institute in September but taught only part-time due to a research grant from the Fonds National (see research, below). Anthony Mortimer, Emeritus Professor of English at the University of Fribourg, Valerie Fehlbaum of the University of Geneva and Regina Schneider, also at Fribourg, all taught literature courses in replacement of Professor Tudeau-Clayton.

In Linguistics, Dorota Smyk continued teaching the Introduction to Linguistics course as well as a seminar in the Winter semester before returning to Zurich to finish her doctorate. Andrew McIntyre, our new Assistant Professor of English Linguistics, is an expert in English and German theoretical linguistics. He started teaching at the institute in March.

Patrick Zambianchi's year as an assistant enabled him to apply and to get accepted in the Comparative Literature graduate program at the University of Washington, Seattle.

Indira Ghose, "Women Travellers in Colonial India". Prof. Ghose teaches English literature at the University of Fribourg. She has written one monograph and edited several anthologies on women travel writers in India.

A. Outside Funding

A Fonds National Research Grant liberated Margaret Tudeau-Clayton for the completion of two research projects on Shakespeare, one a collection of essays in preparation with Prof Willy Maley of Glasgow University, the other, a book on the ideology of Shakespeare's linguistic practices.

Patrick Vincent applied in January 2007 for a Fonds National Research Grant, entitled "Revolutionary-Era British Travellers in Switzerland (1779-1803): Editing Three Major Texts."
